

From the Desk of Pastor Kelly

There's a special tradition that I enjoy participating in during children's sermons on the Lenten/ Easter seasons. I don't know if it has a name, but I like to describe it as "The Disappearance of the Alleluia." One Catholic church's website describes it very well:

"The Alleluia is Hebrew, meaning "praise Yahweh." Traditionally, it has been seen as the chief term of praise of the choirs of angels, as they worship around the throne of God in Heaven. It is a term of great joy, and our use of the Alleluia during worship is a way of participating in the angels' worship. It is also a reminder that the Kingdom of Heaven has already begun on earth through Jesus, and that our worship is a way for us to participate in the Kingdom.

In order to emphasize the penitential nature of that journey, the Catholic Church, during Lent, removes the Alleluia from the Mass. We no longer sing with the choirs of angels; instead, we acknowledge our sins and practice repentance so that one day we may again have the privilege of worshiping God as the angels do."

Not a lot of United Methodist congregations have the tradition of omitting the word "Alleluia" during Lent, but I like to have fun with it! On the Sunday before Lent, I have in previous years enjoyed having all the children in the congregation come up during the children's sermon and scream "Alleluia" as loudly as they possibly can, celebrating the last time before Easter that we focus on the Kingdom's impending arrival, and recognizing that during Lent we will focus on participating in the present time in what we can do to help God prepare the way for the Kingdom. This, of course, is very difficult to explain to children; but they (and I) have greatly enjoyed screaming "Alleluia" at the top of our lungs in the middle of the service!

Even more than this, we get to do it again on Easter Sunday, when the Alleluia returns! Even when children aren't present, I use the opportunity to have the congregation "Alleluia" as many times as I can that day. I feel that this adds to our celebration and helps us get into the festive spirit. So I invite you to, during the rest of our season of Lent, prepare your heart and your mind to receive the coming Easter joy of the risen Christ– and to once again participate in praising the Lord of all with heavenly the choirs of angels who reside above!
